The Museum Development Yorkshire Small Grants Fund can provide funding for a variety of projects in your museum. Our Small Development Grant Scheme assists museums to implement advice, test new ways of working and make good things happen. It also supports personnel to attend training courses and conferences.

The amount awarded is up to £3,000 per project with a sliding scale of match funding required. The fund for this financial year is now live and available on an open application basis, with assessments made on a monthly basis. All monies must be spent and claimed by the end of the financial year.

Leeds City Museum Named as Family Friendly Museum of the Year 2018

Kids in Museums awards the prize annually to one museum that has made outstanding efforts to welcome children and families and respond to their feedback. The charity received over 550 nominations from both families and museums, which were whittled down to a shortlist of 11 by an expert panel.

Undercover family judges then visited and assessed each shortlisted museum against the Kids in Museums Manifesto, with their experiences deciding the winner. Baby-friendly curator talks, signposted selfie points, 'Dadstastic' Days, and excellent facilities are just some of the things that helped Leeds to fend off the competition.

Leeds City Museum stood out for its 'warm and welcoming' staff, who were present throughout the museum and went the extra mile to help visitors. Families also praised the museum for being representative of the different communities in Leeds in its exhibitions.

Leeds is the third Yorkshire attraction to win the accolade, joining previous winners York Art Gallery (2016) and Weston Park Museum in Sheffield (2008).

Meeting Point by Arts&Heritage

Yorkshire museums selected to take part in contemporary art programme

Two museums in Yorkshire have been selected to take part in Meeting Point, an Arts Council England funded programme that partners museums and artists, resulting in the creation of new artworks, each inspired by an individual venue and its collections.

The programme, which is led by contemporary arts agency Arts&Heritage, aims to attract new audiences to the participating venues by placing contemporary artwork in unexpected spaces, and also helps museum staff to gain skills in commissioning and working with artists.

The six participating venues are:

- Colne Valley Museum in Huddersfield
- Grace Darling Museum in Bamburgh, Northumberland
- Port Sunlight Village Trust in Merseyside
- Sheffield Industrial Museums Trust
- Warrington Museum and Arts Gallery and
- Washington Old Hall in Tyne and Wear.

Melanie Williams, Trustee at Colne Valley Museum, said: 'We are delighted Colne Valley Museum has been chosen as one of six museums to take part in the project. This gives us a fantastic opportunity to commission contemporary artists to produce new work inspired by the experience of visiting the museum and its setting. Building on the museum's recent redevelopment, we hope to take full advantage of our great new exhibition space and allow the community to experience the museum and its collections in new and exciting ways.'

Helen Featherstone, director of Sheffield Industrial Museums Trust said: 'Sheffield Industrial Museums Trust is thrilled to be part of Meeting Point. We're really excited about the prospect of being able to commission contemporary art in our heritage setting, and we hope this will delight our regular visitors whilst also appealing to those

who may not ordinarily think that we are a place for them.'

This is the third Meeting Point programme, building on the success of two previous programmes which have seen a total of 19 museums working with 24 curators to create 19 new artworks and over 100 workshops.

Animat 18 Bursaries Available

Animat18 is a yearlong national touring programme supported by ACE, BFI and The British Council.

Historic England Funded Leadership Training Bursaries

Bursaries supported by Historic England are available for heritage sector professionals in England on three residential Clore Leadership courses taking place between February and June 2019.

Historic England is particularly keen to support applications from people with Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic heritage and disabled people working in heritage in recognition of the under-representation of these groups in the sector and especially in leadership positions. Historic England will also prioritise applications from smaller organisations in the sector that have limited access to training opportunities.

John Ellerman Foundation's Museums and Galleries Fund

The Fund aims to help strengthen regional museums and galleries in the UK. We want to help organisations enhance and sustain curatorial development to attract a broader public.

We generally allocate £0.5 million each year to this fund. We expect to make about five or six grants for periods of two to three years. While the average grant size is ca. £86k we will consider higher amounts for exceptional projects. We are particularly interested in applications which:

- enable new ways of working both for established curators and those just starting out or
- ensure organisations are able to safeguard and advance curatorial skills through a time of development or change.

In line with our general policy, we favour organisations with an income between £100,000 and £10m, but may fund a larger institution if it is uniquely placed to meet our aim.

Who can apply

We focus on visual and decorative arts and social and natural history collections. The applicant should demonstrate:

- excellence in their field at a national level
- national significance, usually through a unique or high quality collection.

AIM Hallmarks Awards

Grants of up to £12,000 for AIM Members

Funded by Arts Council England through AIM's National Portfolio Organisation funding, the AIM Hallmarks Awards will provide grants totalling around £55,000 each year over the next four years and are available in two strands:

Main grants of £4,000 to £12,000: will enable museums to implement the key ideas of the AIM Hallmarks. We will support projects that have an impact on museums' ways of working, culture, strategy or business model. These will be open to all Accredited AIM member museums in England.

Small grants of £3,000 – **£6,000**: will support museums to improve their financial sustainability through either cost saving or income generation. These will only be open to Accredited AIM member museums in England in AIM's small museum category (that is, museums with up to 20,000 visitors a year).

Closing date for first round of both strands: 20 November 2018.

There will be one further round in each of the years 2019 - 2021.
