## Good Showing for Yorkshire Museums at the Collections Trust Awards



Yorkshire had two finalists in this year's Collection Trust Awards. The prize of £1,000 for collections management is awarded for collections projects that have happened during the last 12 months and the final five included: Barnsley Museums, who were Highly Commended for a project around the redisplay of Experience Barnsley; and Kiplin Hall, with the work that staff and volunteers had been doing to bring the Annie Marchant collection to the Hall and make it accessible to visitors both actual and virtual. Kiplin were announced as the winners at the event on Zoom.

## Sign up by 9 May

The last year has changed much for museums and many have responded by giving renewed attention to their online presence.

# Esmée Fairbairn Collections Fund From the Museums Association

The MA award the fund on behalf of the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation to projects that demonstrate the significance, distinctiveness and power of collections to people. We're making changes to the Collections Fund in 2021 to support some of the varied and challenging situations of different museums across the UK, and to help museums think about recovering together with their communities through collections engagement.

This year we will offer two funding streams for collections engagement, both offering grants of up to £90,000 over around two years. Expression of interest deadlines are 26 April for grant awards in July and 13 September for awards in December, following a two-stage process. In total £1.3m will be awarded, anticipated to be across 7 to 10 projects in each funding round.

## **Curatorial Curios by Dieter**

## **Livingstone Hearth Ornament**

Unfortunately I have received no responses to my earlier posting so here are some of my thoughts:

As a former curator of social history I have always known these decorative items as dust or ash preventers for use with a solid fuel kitchen range or fire. In the Nineteenth Century these generally had a raised hearth to allow for good air flow to encourage combustion of the coal or other fuel and to allow the burned ash to fall to a recess or ash pan below. Coal was generally cheaply and frequently locally available especially in mining districts like Yorkshire.



a tender. These were the domain of domestic staff in wealthier households who were responsible for keeping the household warm and tidy. The object bears no foundry or other marks to indicate where it or when it was made and it could have been produced at one or more of many local foundries which were in mid-Nineteenth Century Britain.

They are also known regionally as 'Tidy Bettys' I don't know the derivation of this or whether there are any other local or regional names. Generally made from cast-iron which could be cleaned with a brush or rubbed with a paste of ash mixed with water applied with a rag after which a regular coating of 'blacking' or 'black lead' graphite paste (Zebrite, Zebra or Zebo are common brands in social history collections) would be applied and buffed up to a sheen. Some had elaborate designs or brass decoration or were embellished with contemporary national heroes, as here with Livingstone. Other examples are known depict explorer and colonial administrator HM Stanley (1841 -1904) and prime minister and liberal politician WE Gladstone (1809 -1898) which must have been roughly contemporary with this one.

As the hearth was seen as the symbolic centre of the home, did these items represent political statements about the interests of the resident family? Or were they even possibly intended as instructional to the domestic staff as characters to be admired? Their political social and historical status might be seen very differently today. Although domestic open fires continued to be widely used until the 1960s, ranges were increasingly replaced by gas or electric ovens but it is likely that these 'political' objects became unfashionable and were consigned to the store long before that.
